Is there an obligation on every individual to say the ר׳ נחוני׳ בן הקנה?

The פירוש המשניות, in מירוש, writes that there is a חובה on every person to say them. He continues that they are not really יתפלותי, and, as such, there is no need to turn one's face to the east or west, to bow or fall on the face; rather, they may be recited in whatever position he wishes, both sitting and standing.

What exactly should one say?

For one who enters the בית המדרש, we have the text found in the משנה. [If he learns with a חבורה, he should daven that neither he, nor they, should blunder and cause the other to laugh at him. According to the מהרייי, אבוהב, one prays, יואשמח מהםי; namely, that I should enjoy my learning.] The would say it every morning and would add a couple of מגן אברהם.

The טייז writes that even if a person learns on his own, outside of the בית המדרש, he must still daven that he not err in his לימוד; especially if he paskens הלכה. The טייז provides an abridged תפלה, which incorporates the various applicable בקשות.

The מגן אברהם concludes that, when one finishes his learning for the day, even if he learns ביחידות, he should say the רי נחוניי that רי נחוניי would recite.
